Dear Families of the Catholic Schools of the Diocese of Columbus,



Sadly, our work is not yet done as we labor forward under the continued challenges of this pandemic. Through this letter, I want to encourage you to stay vigilant and strong in the safety protocols in place in our schools. The wearing of masks, the maintenance of appropriate social distancing, the adherence to quarantine directives from the local health departments, keeping children home when they show any symptoms associated with coronavirus or with any illness, and making careful, responsible decisions about activities outside of school will continue to allow our schools to serve you. The last point is very important given the spread of the virus is happening in gatherings and activities outside the schools at an alarming rate across the state. For that reason, our perseverance is even more necessary.

Recently, the Holy Father, Pope Francis, released his latest encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti*. As I read his powerful message of fraternity and friendship, I paused at his call for a renewed cultivation of kindness, that great fruit of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Father tells us that kindness is that virtue that pushes back on self-focus and that, through “esteem and respect for others” can create a culture that is transformative. It is this virtue that we saw in action that allowed us to return to school and the same virtue that we must continue to cultivate in ourselves and in our schools so that we may carry on in this difficult journey together amid so much fear and sickness.
